Human beings are social creatures. We are born an infant and become a person through our interactions with others. We crave and need to interact with others. It is our way of learning how to integrate into society, to learn how to communicate, how to fit in and survive.

Humans have an internal need to be part of a group, to learn from each other, help each other, comfort each other, care for each other.

When one is interviewed for medical school, nursing school, etc., one of the questions often asked is "Why do you want to go into medicine?"

Frequently the answer is "to help people". Students are advised that a more in depth or different answer may be more effective in making an impression on the interviewer. But when it comes down to it, that's why most of us do our jobs. Mechanics, chefs, housekeepers, teachers, construction workers, nurses, clergy...we all help people. We all want to help people. It is ingrained in us; it is part of who we are.

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Being with people and socializing is a need. A deep desire. The human touch, the presence of others, of those we love can be therapeutic. We need people to survive.

So, yes, it is difficult to practice social distancing, to self-isolate or quarantine, to avoid group activities. We miss visiting our families and friends, especially when they are in the hospital, living centers and care facilities. They miss us. We miss them.

COVID-19 is not picky, anyone can come down with it, some can even have it, not have symptoms and pass it on to others. We do know that some can be at higher risk for complications and death. Those at highest risk are those with medical issues and the elderly, those in the hospital and care facilities.

Restrictions on visitors to the hospital and care facilities were not instituted lightly. We take the responsibility and privilege of caring for our and your loved ones very seriously. Like parents, we want to care for and protect them. By limiting or restricting visitors, we are attempting to keep illness outside of the building, away from the patients and away from those that are caring

for them, so they can remain healthy to do their job. We are also trying to keep illnesses from leaving the building. The challenge with COVID-19 is that it can come and go without notice. We know that one starts to be contagious 2 days prior to symptoms starting, and may not have symptoms at all, but still be contagious.

Restrictions on visitors is guided by the prevalence of illness in our community. Restrictions can be lifted when the infection rate decreases and the positivity rate drops. A goal for low transmission is a positivity rate of less than 5 percent. The positivity rate in Iowa has typically remained between 7 percent and 9 percent.

Decreasing the infection rate, the positivity rate, can be done by washing hands, social distancing and wearing masks when in public. Wearing is caring.

We are social creatures. We all want to beat COVID-19. And in order to do that we need each other. We need each of us to wear a mask and physically distance.

Let's all do what's right and take care of each other.

OF A PROPOSED ACTIVITY IN A 100-YEAR FLOODPLAIN OR WETLAND

Publication Date: August 5, 2020 This is to give notice that the City of Farmersburg has conducted an evaluation as required by Executive Order 11988 and/or 11990, in accordance with HUD regulations at 24 CFR 55.20 Subpart C Procedures for Making Determinations on Floodplain Management, to de-termine the potential affect that its activity in the floodplain and wetland will have on the human environment for a CDBG Life Station and Force Main Project (#20-WS

010). The project involves the construction of a new lift station and installation of a 6-inch force main that has the capacity to handle wet weather flows and eliminate the City's need to bypass. The project will

be funded with a combination of CDBG and DNR/SRF funds.

The project activities will occur at the existing lift station site and east along Park Drive to the existing wastewater treatment plant within the City limits of Farmersburg, Iowa, and will include less than 1 acre of floodplain.

There are three primary purposes for this notice. First, people who may be affected by activities in floodplains and those who have an interest in the protection of the natural environment should be given an opportunity to express their concerns and provide information about these areas. Second, an adequate public notice program can be an important public educational tool. The dissemination of information about floodplains can facilitate and enhance Federal efforts to reduce the risks associated with the occupancy and

modification of these special areas. Third, as a matter of fairness, when the Federal government determines it will participate actions taking place in floodplains, it must inform those who may be put at greater or continued risk.

In 2019 the city submitted a Resource

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Enhancement and Protection (REAP) The grant was for a proposed Rec Trail Extension from Gateway Park to the intersection of S. Main and Spruce street. The cost in 2019 was estimated at \$93,317. The REAP Grant amount requested by the city was \$75,000. We ranked 14th out of 26 submissions for populations under 2000. The REAP Grant paid out the top eight submission. City Administrator Collins checked into what it would take to resubmit the grant again this year. Engineer Jon Bieder-man, with Fehr-Graham, said he would be able to update the cost projection and concept map for around \$200. Paul Berland, executive director for Northeast Iowa RC&D, Inc. said they would be able to update the grant and have ready for submission by Friday, July 31st for around \$500. City Administrator Collins also reminded the council that if the city were awarded money from the grant RC&D would receive another 2% of the award. After more discussion on what we should try to add or change in the grant it was moved by Lange, seconded by Landt to approve updating and resubmitting the 2019 REAP Grant.
