

PUBLIC NOTICE

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Notice is hereby given in accordance with Section 273 of the Code of Iowa that an election for a member of the Board of Directors of Keystone Area Education Agency from Director District 3 will be conducted in November. The director district includes the Allamakee, Clayton Ridge, Eastern Allamakee, and MFL MarMac Community School Districts. The director will be elected by the boards of those districts. The election is for a 4-year term for the director from Director District 3, and the term expires in 2025.

Candidates for the vacancy on the Board of Directors of the Keystone Area Education Agency must be electors and residents of Director District 3. The candidates may be members of a local school district board of education but may not be an employee of a school district in Area 1. A candidate may secure a Statement of Candidacy form from the board secretary of the Keystone AEA, Elkader, Iowa. Nominees for the vacancy will be those filing the statement with the Keystone AEA board secretary by October 15, 2021. If no candidate files by the deadline, a convention will be scheduled with prior notice given, and persons may file for candidacy or be nominated at the convention. Each board of education within the director district may cast a vote, weighted according to the school district's population, for the election of a member to the Agency's Board of Directors.

ORDINANCE CITY OF MONONA

ORDINANCE NO. 417-21
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF MONONA, IOWA 2007, BY AMENDING PROVISIONS PERTAINING TO ANIMAL PROTECTION AND CONTROL
BE IT ENACTED by the City Council of the City of Monona, Iowa:
SECTION 1. SECTION MODI-FIED, Chapter 55, Sections 09, 10, 11, 12, and 17 of the Code of Or-di-nances of the City of Monona, Iowa 2007, are repealed and the follow-ing adopted in lieu thereof:
55.09 DANGEROUS AND VI-CIOUS ANIMALS
1. Definitions. For use in this chapter, the following definitions shall apply:
A. "Dangerous Animal" means: (a) any animal which is not nat-urally tame or gentle, and which is of a wild nature or disposition, and which is capable of killing, inflic-ting serious injury upon, or causing disease among human beings or domestic animals and have known tendencies as a species to do so; (b) the following animals, which are deemed to be dangerous animals per se:
(1) Badgers, wolverines, wea-sels, skunks, and mink;
(2) Raccoons;
(3) Bats;
(4) Scorpions;
(5) Piranhas;
(6) Wolves; coyotes, and foxes;
(7) Alligators and crocodiles;
(8) Lions, tigers, jaguars, leop-ards, cougars, lynx, and bobcats;
(9) Bears;
(10) Monkeys and Chimpanzees;
B. "Vicious Animal" means any animal, except for a dangerous animal per se, as listed above, that has bitten or clawed a person or persons while running at large and the attack was unprovoked, or any animal that has exhibited vi-cious tendencies in present or past conduct, including such that said animal (a) has bitten or clawed a person or persons causing injuries without provocation; or (b) could not be controlled or restrained by the owner at the time of the attack to prevent the occurrence; or (c) has attacked any domestic animal or fowl without provocation.
C. Non-Domesticated Animals. No person shall keep or allow to be kept in the City, any non-domes-ticated animal or species including but not limited to the following: oce-lots, dingoes, jackals, poisonous snakes, constrictors, and any other animal which is not listed above but which can reasonably be defined by the definition of terms stated herein.
2. Keeping of Dangerous Animals Prohibited. No person shall keep, shelter, or harbor any dangerous animal as a pet, or act as a tempo-rary custodian for such animal, or keep, shelter or harbor such an im-al for any other purpose or in any other capacity within the City except in the following circumstances:
(a) The keeping of dangerous an-imals for exhibition to the public by a bona fide traveling circus, carni-val, exhibit, or show.
(b) The keeping of dangerous an-imals in a bona fide, licensed veteri-nary hospital for treatment.
(c) Any dangerous animals under the jurisdiction of and in the possession of the Iowa Department of Natural Resources, pursuant to Chapters 481A and 481B of the Code of Iowa.
3. Sales or Purchases. No person shall possess with intent to sell, offer for sale, breed, transfer owner-ship of or buy or attempt to transfer ownership of or buy any dangerous animal.
4. Exemptions
A. This section shall not apply to animals used by a police depart-ment or law enforcement agency.
B. No animal may be declared dangerous for injury or damage sustained by a person who was

committing a willful trespass or other tort upon the premises of the animal's owner.
C. No animal may be declared dangerous for injury or damage sustained by a person who was teasing, tormenting, abusing, or as-saulting the animal.
D. A traveling circus, zoological park, or show which keeps wild animals for a temporary exhibition may keep such animals within the city for a period not to exceed 30 days, provided the person, traveling circus, zoological park, or show has obtained a state permit or is exempt from such requirement.
5. Seizure, Impoundment and Disposition
A. In the event that a dangerous animal or vicious animal is found at large and unattended upon public property, park property, public right-of-way, or the property of someone other than its owner, thereby creat-ing a hazard to persons or property, such animal may, at the discretion of the Police Chief, be destroyed if it cannot be confined or captured. The City shall be under no duty to attempt the confinement or capture of a dangerous animal or vicious animal found at large, nor shall it have a duty to notify the owner of such animal prior to its destruction.
B. Upon the complaint of any in-dividual that a person is keeping, sheltering, or harboring a danger-ous or vicious animal on premises in the City, the City Administrator or Police Chief shall cause the mat-ter to be investigated and if after investigation the facts indicate that the person named in the complaint is keeping, sheltering or harboring a dangerous or vicious animal in the City, the Police Chief shall or-der the person named in the com-plaint to safely remove such animal from the City, or humanely destroy the animal within three (3) days of the receipt of such an order. Such order shall be contained in a no-tice to remove the dangerous or vicious animal, which notice shall be given in writing to the person keeping, sheltering or harboring the dangerous or vicious animal, and shall be served personally or by certified mail. Such order and notice to remove the dangerous or vicious animal shall not be required where such animal has previously caused serious physical harm or death to any person, in which case the Police Chief shall cause the animal to be immediately seized and impounded or killed if seizure and impoundment are not possible with-out risk of serious physical harm or death to any person.
55.10 RABIES VACCINATION
Every owner of a dog or cat over six (6) months of age, being main-tained or harbored, at any time in the corporate limits of the City of Monona, Iowa shall be vaccinated against rabies by an approved vac-cine administered by a veterinarian who shall maintain a record of vac-cination for a period of at least three (3) years, and who shall issue the owner of such animal a Vaccination Certificate (which shall be retained by said owner until it expires and is renewed) and a vaccination tag. It is unlawful for any person to own or have a dog or cat in said person's possession, six months of age or over which has not been vaccinat-ed against rabies. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate, from a licensed veterinarian, with the rab-ies tag number must be brought to city hall to be recorded. This vac-cination certificate is good for 1- to 3-year period based on the rabies vaccination schedule or certificate of that dog/cat. The failure to pro-cure such certificate when so re-quested by the Police Department or its representative shall be prima facie evidence that such animal has not been vaccinated.
55.11 OWNER'S DUTY It is the duty of the owner of any dog, cat or other animal which has bitten or

attacked a person or other animal or any person having knowledge of such bite or attack to report this act to the City Administrator or Po-lice Chief. It is the duty of the phy-sicians and veterinarians to report to the City Administrator or Police Chief the existence of any animal known or suspected to be suffering from rabies.
55.12 CONFINEMENT.
1. If the City Administrator or Police Chief receives information that an animal has bitten a person or animal or that a dog or animal is suspected of having rabies, the City Administrator or Police Chief shall apprehend and impound the animal, and the owner must cover the cost of impoundment. The owner can choose to safely remove such animal from the City and the animal can never return to the City, or hu-manely destroy the animal within three (3) days of the receipt of such an order from the City Administrator or Police Chief. Failure to comply with an order of the City Administra-tor or Police Chief issued pursuant to this chapter constitutes a simple misdemeanor.
2. The order to remove a danger-ous or vicious animal issued by the City Administrator or Police Chief may be appealed to the Council. In order to appeal such order, a written notice of appeal must be filed with the Clerk within three (3) days after receipt of the order contained in the notice to remove the dangerous or vicious animal. Failure to file such written notice of appeal shall consti-tute a waiver of the right to appeal the order of the City Administrator or Police Chief.
3. The notice of appeal shall state the grounds for such appeal and shall be delivered personal-ly or by certified mail to the Clerk. The hearing of such appeal shall be scheduled within seven (7) days of the receipt of the notice of appeal. The hearing may be continued for good cause. After such hearing, the Council may affirm or reverse the order of the City Administrator or Police Chief. Such determina-tion shall be contained in a written decision and shall be filed with the Clerk within three (3) days after the hearing or any continued session thereof.
4. If the Council affirms the action of the City Administrator or Police Chief, the Council shall order in its written decision that the per-son owning, sheltering, harboring or keeping such dangerous or vi-cious animal remove such animal from the City or humanely destroy it. The decision and order shall immediately be served upon the person against whom rendered in the same manner as the notice of removal. If the original order of the City Administrator or Police Chief is not appealed and is not complied with within three (3) days or the order of the Council after appeal is not complied with within (3) days of its issuance, the City Adminis-trator or Police Chief is authorized to seize, impound, or destroy such dangerous or vicious animal. Fail-ure to comply with an order of the City Administrator or Police Chief issued pursuant to this chapter and not appealed, or of the Council after appeal, constitutes a simple misde-meanor.

55.17 DOG/CAT REGISTRA-TION/TAGS REQUIRED
1. Dog/Cat Registration Re-quired. Every owner of a dog or cat shall register said dog/cat with the City. Exception to this requirement includes a thirty-day residency grace period.
2. Registration Records. The

Clerk or Police Department repre-sentative shall maintain a public record of each registration contain-ing the name and information of the owner and name, sex, breed, color, date of birth, spayed or neutered and microchip number of the dog/cat.
3. Rabies Tags.
A. The veterinarian shall issue a metal rabies vaccination tag show-ing the name of the veterinarian, the tag number, and the year of is-suance, as required by Iowa State Law, which will duplicate as the re-quired tag for the city.
B. The rabies tag issued by the veterinarian shall be securely fas-tened by the owner to a collar or harness which shall be worn at all times by the dog/cat for which it was issued unless the animal is kept in-side. It shall be unlawful for any person other than the owner to re-move the collar from the dog or cat.
C. A rabies tag issued for one dog/cat shall not be transferable to another dog/cat. Upon the ex-piration of the tag the owner shall remove said tag from the dog/cat.
D. Any dog/cat found running at large without the rabies tab at-tached to its collar or harness shall be deemed unvaccinated.
E. The Monona Police Depart-ment or City Hall shall be notified immediately of all lost or reissued tags.
4. Enforcement
A. Veterinarians shall in no way be responsible for the enforcement of the required tags with the City of Monona. Enforcement of this chap-ter shall be the responsibility of the Monona Police Department or its representatives.
B. Law enforcement officials shall enforce the provisions of the chapter relating to vaccination and impoundment of dogs/cats. Such public officials shall not be respon-sible for any accident or disease of a dog/cat resulting from the en-forcement of the provisions of said chapter.
C. A dog or cat shall be appre-hended and impounded by law en-forcement officials if the dog/cat is running at large and/or the dog/cat is not wearing a valid rabies vac-ci-nation tag, or a rabies vaccination certificate is not on file with the city or presented to law enforcement officials.
D. Disposition of impounded animal shall be undertaken pursuant to code § 55.16
E. Any owner of an unregistered and/or unvaccinated dog or cat is guilty of a misdemeanor and may be punished by a fine up to \$750 or by imprisonment up to 30 days.

SECTION 2. SEVERABILITY CLAUSE. If any section, provision or part of this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any section, provision or part thereof not adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.
SECTION 3. WHEN EFFEC-TIVE. This ordinance shall be in effect from and after its final pas-sage, approval and publication as provided by law.
