The Monona, Iowa, City Council met in regular session Monday, February 15, 2021 at 6:00 p.m. in the Monona Community Center. Mayor Eric Koenig presided with John Elledge, Andrew Meyer, Bridget Schlein, Timothy Wright, and Preston Landt present.

Guests Present: Jared Burkle (PeopleService), John Jensen (The Outlook), Audrey Posten (North Iowa Times), Jo Amsden (Police Chief), and Nichole Nuehring.

1) Approve Consent Agenda
Moved by Elledge, seconded by Meyer, to approve consent agenda as submitted. Carried Unanimously.

2) Hearing of Delegations
None

3) PeopleService Report
PeopleService operator Jared Burkle discussed written Operations and Maintenance (O&M) reports for Water and Wastewater Departments for January 2021

Water O&M

- Completed the 2020 Annual Water Use Report and sent to the Iowa DNR.
- Completed 2020 Tier II Report
- Updated the Monona flushing plan on the People Service server. This is important because if Jared is unable to work, his replacement will be able to transition into the position easier.

Wastewater O&M

- Throughout the month took samples to the lab in Waterloo due to the short hold times for the E. Coli samples.
- Due to cold weather, had foaming issues in the clarifiers throughout the month. Cleaned weekly to keep the scum lines flowing freely.
- Found blown fuse that controls the timer for the grit conveyor. Replaced fuse and is running correctly.

Received a letter from Amber Sauser, Iowa DNR, regarding our Wastewater Treatment Facility Annual Inspection. Will send a copy to Forrest Aldrich and talk to him about a response before March 1st.

4) Change Dates for March Council Meetings
Due to timing of items pertaining to the Kwik Trip Sewer and Water Expansion, the dates for the March council meeting would work better if they were the 8th and 22nd instead of the 1st and 15th. It was moved by Wright, seconded by Landt to change the March 2021 council meetings to March 8, 2021 and March 22, 2021. Carried Unanimously.

5) PUBLIC HEARING: FY 2020/2021 Proposed Property Tax Levy
Mayor Koenig opened public hearing at 6:05 p.m.

Administrator Collins explained that the total 384.15A Maximum Tax Levy for FY2021/2022 would be no higher than \$577,314. Having received no written or oral comments, Mayor Koenig declared the public hearing closed at 6:06 p.m.

6) Approve Resolution No. 2021-07 Approving FY2021/2022 Proposed Property Tax Levy
After brief discussion, it was moved by Meyer, seconded by Wright, to approve Resolution No. 2021-07 setting the total 384.15A Maximum Tax Levy at \$577,314. Roll Call Vote: Ayes ~ Five, Nays ~ None. Resolution was adopted.

7) Police Report
Police Chief, Jo Amsden, discussed January 2021 monthly police activity summary. Chief Amsden stated that they were working on the new police charger and hoped to have it ready to be used in the next two weeks. Talked briefly about snowmobiles in town. Clayton County Snowbird Club and someone from the City will be working on a possible change to the city ordinance on snowmobiles within city limits.

8) Set Public Hearing Date to Review and Consider Zoning Classification Recommendations from the Monona planning and Zoning Commission for Parcels Recently Annexed into Monona

Three ag land parcels and three commercial parcels located on the south side of HWY 18/52 were recently annexed in Monona City Limits. The Monona Planning and Zoning commission presented their Zoning Classification recommendations to the City Council. These six parcels comprise 41.36 acres. It was moved by Elledge, seconded by Meyer to set March 8, 2021 at 6:00 p.m., Monona Community Center to hold the public hearing to consider the zoning classifications for these six parcels. Carried Unanimously.

9) Resolution No. 2021-08 Setting Date for Public Hearing on Designation of the Expanded Monona Urban Renewal Area and on Urban Renewal Plan Amendment
The city has decided to use tax increment financing (TIF) funds to pay for the sewer and water expansion to the newly annexed area on the south side of HWY 18 and 52. Because of this decision the city would need to expand the Monona Urban Renewal Area and amend the Urban Renewal Plan. It was moved by Wright, seconded by Elledge to set March 8, 2021 at 6:00 p.m. in the Monona Community Center as the time and place to hold the public hearing. Roll Call Vote: Ayes ~ Five, Nays ~ None. Resolution was adopted.

10) Resolution No. 2021-09 to Provide a Notice of Hearing on Proposed Plans, Specification, Form of Contract and Estimate of Cost for the Kwik Star Water and Sewer Utility Extension Project, and the Taking of Bids Therefor
Notice will be posted to bidders for the water and sewer extension project on February 16th with bids due to City Hall by 2:00 p.m. on March 17th. It was moved by Schlein, seconded by Landt to set March 22, 2021 at 6:00 p.m. in the Monona Community Center as the time and place to hold public hearing. Roll Call Vote: Ayes ~ Five, Nays ~ None. Resolution was adopted.

11) V & K (Forrest Aldrich) Kwik Star Water & Sewer Extension Project Update
A revised project schedule was submitted to the council for the Kwik Star Water & Sewer Extension Project. The letter stated that council would need to set public hearing date on February 15th, Notice to Bidders would be posted February 16th, Publish Notice of Public Hearing by March 3rd, receive and open bids on March 17th and hold public hearing and award contract on March 22nd. All work needs to be completed by October 1, 2021. Also included in the council packet was the results of the soiling boring done on the North and South side of HWY 18 and 52.

12) Approve Fiscal Year 2021/2022 Donation of \$2,712 to Substance Abuse Services for Clayton County, Inc.
A letter was received from Merry French, program director for Substance Abuse Services for Clayton County, Inc (SASCC). The letter thanked the city for their past contributions and asked if they would consider adding a contribution of \$2,712 to our 2021/2022 budget. After minimal discussion it was moved by Landt, seconded by Meyer to approve a contribution of \$2,712 to SASCC for the 2021/2022 fiscal year. Ayes ~ Four, Nays ~ One, motion carried.

13) Lawn Spraying Proposals for 2021 Season
Two proposals were received for spraying of weed control for six areas in town. First proposal was from Tieskoetter Lawn Care for \$2,250 for spring and fall application. The second proposal was from All American Turf Beauty for \$2,571.38 for a spring and fall application. It was moved by Elledge, seconded by Wright to accept the \$2,250 proposal from Tieskoetter Lawn Care. Carried Unanimously.

14) New City Hall Copier Lease
After being tabled at the Febru-

ary 1st meeting, City Administrator Collins brought up the issue of a new copier for the administrative offices. Our current lease expires May 5th. Two proposals were received from Access and Marco for the return of our current copier and a new three-year lease of a new copier. Also presented to the council was the option of keeping the current copier and putting it in the police department and leasing a new copier for the administrative offices. After much discussion on the cost of the copier, maintenance, and usage of the copier in both the police department and administrative offices, it was moved by Elledge, seconded by Schlein to enter a three-year contract with Marco to move the current copier to the police department and get a new copier for the administrative offices for a locked amount of \$262 a month for 36 months. This contract would include 100% maintenance agreement for parts, labor, toner, connectivity assurance issues and service calls. Carried Unanimously.

15) Monona MCED 2020 4th Quarter Report and Hay Days Date Set for June 12, 2021
Monona Chamber and Economic Development Director, Rogeta Halvorson, submitted her 4th quarter 2020 report to the council. She also stated that the Monona Hay Days committee set June 12, 2021 for Monona Hays Days.

16) Set Public Hearing Date for Adoption of Final 2021/2022 Budget
It was moved by Wright, seconded by Meyer to set a public hearing date for adoption of the final 2021/2022 budget for March 22, 2022 at 6:00 p.m. at the Monona Community Center. Carried Unanimously.

Mayor/Council/Administration Notes:

- Seneca Co. will be back working at FreedomBank parking lot February 23rd to 25th.
- Eagle Point Solar will be in town the 17th viewing possible solar sights for City.
- Talked about who is responsible for cleaning snow around fire hydrants.

Hearing no further comments, Mayor Koenig declared meeting adjourned at 6:40 p.m.

The Monona, Iowa, City Council met in open session Monday, February 15, 2021 at 6:45 p.m. Mayor Eric Koenig presided with John Elledge, Bridget Schlein, Andy Meyer, Timothy Wright, and Preston Landt present.

Guests Present: None
1) Review Status of FY2021-2022 Preliminary City Budget
Special Council Meeting was held to review and discuss Preliminary Draft of FY2021-2022 City Budget and Proposed Property Tax Levy. Administrator Collins provided the following items to mayor and council members as part of the budget:

- FY2021-2022 Approved Max Property Tax Levy and overall City Budget Revenues & Expenditures
- Budgets for General Fund, Library Fund, Road Use Tax Fund (RUT), Capital Equipment Fund, Trust & Agency Fund, Debt Service Levy, Sewer Fund, Water Fund, Debt Service, Garbage Fund, Tax Increment Financing (TIF) Fund, Health Fund Account, Building Trust Fund, Internal Loan Fund, LMI Fund, Health Insurance and Capital Projects Account.

- Street Maintenance & Repairs
- Status of Tax Increment Financing (TIF) Revenue Projects ~ Oak Street Sanitary Sewer Extension, Rec Trail Extension, Gordon Estates Development, and the new 100 Block Page Street Improvement Project.
- Budget Certification Form as provided by Iowa Department of Management (DOM)

Property Tax Levy:
Administrator Collins explained components of proposed Certification of City Property Taxes Form that would need to be filed with Clayton County Auditor upon final

city budget approval. Line-item Property Tax Levy amounts for Regular General Levy, Community Center Maintenance, Property/Liability Insurance, Public Library Support, Employee Benefits and Debt Service were listed on the form. After review of numbers, the proposed property tax levy rate would be \$15.22731 per \$1,000 of Taxable Value on each city property for FY2021-2022 compared to \$14.52875 for current fiscal year budget.

Streets Maintenance and Repair:
City council members again talked about proposed street maintenance work of \$142,373 and equipment needs as discussed with public works director Randy Evanson at the last meeting.

At conclusion of comments, questions, and suggested budget changes, it was consensus of mayor and council members to try and keep the property tax levy rate as close to or lower than current rate. City administrator Collins said she would work with the numbers and see what she could do.

2) Final FY2021-2022 City Budget Approval
City council set the date for the public hearing at the February 15th regular council meeting. The public hearing will be Monday, March 22nd at regular council meeting prior to approving Final Budget the same night with required budget hearing notice to appear in The Outlook Wednesday, March 10th. It was again noted that upon its adoption, Certification of Budget and Property Taxes Resolution must be submitted to the Clayton County Auditor by Wednesday, March 31st.

There being no further business, Mayor Koenig declared meeting adjourned at 7:20 p.m.
