3) Public Hearing: FY2021-2022 City Budget Amendment

Mayor Langhus opened public hearing at 6:01 p.m. Administrator Collins explained to comply with Chapter 384.18 of the Iowa Code city council needs to amend the FY2021-2022 City Budget as it appeared expenditures would exceed original estimates within any six (6) of the nine (9) expense categories called 'Programs'. City council is required to hold a public hearing prior to amending the Budget. Notice of amendment hearing was published in The Outlook on May 4th as required. A compendium of expenditure programs that would need to be increased to be compliant with city budget process were presented. The amendments totaled an additional expenditure of \$278,447.00. Revenue was not adjusted. Hearing no further comments, questions or objections, Mayor Langhus closed hearing at 6:02 p.m.

5) PeopleService Report PeopleService operator Burkle, discussed written Operations and Maintenance (O&M) reports for Water and Wastewater Departments for April 2022.

Water O&M · Flushed the entire distribution system.

· Cleaned the effluent channel to prepare for quarterly E. Coli testing.
• Got Terra Gator ready from sludge hauling.

· Applied twenty-three loads of sludge to farm field. Stopped hauling due to oil temp alarm on the Terra Gator

· Started to drain the EQ basins and ended the bypass that started on March 25th.

· Found a broken check valve on blower five. Ordered four new check values at around \$360 per valve.

Mayor Langhus asked questions about if dyes could help find some of our I n I issues. He also asked about water pooling around manholes and if this can be an I n I issue. Jared explained about using smoke and dyes and the difficulty in locating the problem. People-Service has double checked all noncompliant sump pumps from the last inspection and have also completed the inspections in the SE quadrant of the city.

6) April Police Report Police Chief Amsden supplied the council with the April report breaking down the 277 calls. Chief Amsden touched briefly on traffic tickets vs. warnings, fake I.D.s, inappropriate texting in middle school, grant for new vest and more surveillance once school is out.

7) \$1,000 Drone Insurance Deductible

The Monona Fire Department recently purchase a Drone to help with certain types of calls. At previous council meetings, insurance for the drone was discussed and finalized with the Rural Board putting the insurance coverage on their policy and the City of Monona reimbursing them for the premium. It was brought up at this meeting about who would cover the deductible in the event the drone was damaged. After some discussion, it was decided to table the matter until one of the council members talked to Monona Fire Chief Smith.

8) Approve Sale Ad for 1994 Chevy Pickup with Snowplow After some discussion on wheth-

er to put a minimum bid in the ad, it was moved Meyer, seconded by Elledge to approve the ad for the sale of the city's 1994 Chevrolet 3/4 ton pickup with a 7 1/2' Western Snowplow with a minimum offer of \$3,000.00. The add will appear in The Outlook on May 25th and June 1st. With the possibility of also running the ad on June 8th. Bids must be turned in at Monona City Hall by 10:00 a.m. on June 10, 2022. Carried Unanimously.

9) Approve Bid for Retaining Wall

on South Main Street

The city received four estimates/ quotes for installing a retaining wall in front of the residence located at 700 S Main Street The wall was requested due to the Main Street Trail Extension that replaced the four-foot sidewalk in front of this residence with an eight-foot-wide trail. It was moved by Elledge, seconded by Schlein to approve the \$10,622.00 bid from Outdoor Creation. Carried Unanimously.

10) Swimming Pool Report City Administrator Collins went over the status of the swimming pool. The pool opening date is still to be determined, closing August 21st with pet swim August 27th. City Hall is currently taking applications for swimming lessons and for single and family pool passes. Collins also talked about the lower number of people applying for life guarding. Currently the pool has nine returning guards and four new guards.

Due to the small number of guards, we are expecting to have changes to pool hours off and on during the summer. The city is looking to hire up to three people to just run the concession stand and take care of pool admissions. The new manager is unknown since Kiersten Winter has resigned since the council meeting and the assistant manager is Kadence Pape. The swim team conference meet will be held at the Monona pool on Saturday, July 9th. Expecting around 1,500 people between swimmers and spectators.

11) Purchase of New Lawn Mower with Bagger

A purchase order for \$4.100.00 was presented to the council for approval for the purchase of a 2022 John Deere X350 Select Series Tractor with a 42-inch mower deck with bagger system. A mower with bagger was needed to mow inside the pool fence. It was also felt that an extra riding mower would come in handy during a rainy week with only a few mowing days available. It was moved by Elledge, seconded by Wright to approve the purchase of the 2022 X350 lawn mower with bagger from Bodensteiner Implement for \$4, 100.00. Carried Unanimously.

12) Consider 2023 Clayton County Marketing Campaign Pledge

This water supply obtains its water from the dolomite and sandstone of the Cambrian-Ordovician aquifer. The Cambrian-Ordovician aquifer was determined to have low susceptibility to contamination because the characteristics of the aquifer and overlying materials provide natural protection from contaminants at the land surface. The Cambrian-Ordovician wells will have low susceptibility to surface contaminants such as leaking underground storage tanks, contaminant spills, and excess fertilizer application.
