## **ORDINANCE** CITY OF MONONA

**ORDINANCE NO. 420-21** AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF MONONA, IOWA, BY AMENDING PROVISIONS
PERTAINING TO PUBLIC DISORDER

Be It Enacted by the City Council of the City of Monona, Iowa: SECTION 1. SECTION MODI-FIED. Section 40.03 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Monona. lowa, is repealed and the following adopted in lieu thereof:

40.03 DISORDERLY CON-DUCT. No person shall do any of the following:

1. Fighting. Engage in fighting or violent behavior in any public place or in or near any lawful assembly of persons, provided that participants in athletic contests may engage in such conduct that is reasonably related to that sport. (Code of lowa, Sec. 723.4[1a])

2. Noise. Make loud and raucous noise in the vicinity of any residence or public building which intentionally or recklessly causes unreasonable distress to the occupants thereof. (Code of Iowa, Sec. 723.4[1b])

3. Abusive Language. Direct abusive epithets or make any threatening gesture that the person knows or reasonably should know this block to reasonably should know the should be is likely to provoke a violent reaction by another.
(Code of Iowa, Sec. 723.4[1c]) 4. Disrupt Lawful Assembly. Without lawful authority or color of authority, disturb any lawful assem-

bly or meeting of persons by con-duct intended to disrupt the meeting or assembly. (Code of Iowa, Sec. 723.4[1d])

5. False Report of Catastrophe. By words or action, initiate or circulate a report or warning of fire, epi-

demic, or other catastrophe, know ing such report to be false or such warning to be baseless.

(Code of Iowa, Sec. 723,4[1e]) 6. Disrespect of Flag. Knowing-ly and publicly use the flag of the United States in such a manner as to show disrespect for the flag as a symbol of the United States, with the intent or reasonable expectation that such use will provoke or encourage another to commit trespass or assault. As used in this subsection:

(Code of Iowa, Sec. 723.4[1f]) A. "Deface" means to intentionally mar the external appearance.

B. "Defile" means to intentionally make physically unclean.

C. "Flag" means a piece of woven

cloth or other material designed to be flown from a pole or mast.
D. "Mutilate" means to intention ally cut up or alter so as to make

E. "Show disrespect" means to deface, defile, mutilate, or trample. F. "Trample" means to intentionally tread upon or intentionally cause a machine, vehicle, or animal to

7. Funeral or Memorial Service. Within 1,000 feet of the building or other location where a funeral or memorial service is being conducted, or within 1,000 feet of a funeral procession or burial:

A. Make loud and raucous noise that causes unreasonable distress to the persons attending the funeral or memorial service or participating in the funeral procession.

B. Direct abusive epithets or make any threatening gesture that the person knows or reasonably should know is likely to provoke a violent reaction by another.

C. Disturb or disrupt the funeral,

memorial service, funeral procession, or burial by conduct intended to disturb or disrupt the funeral, memorial service, funeral procession,

or burial. This subsection applies to conduct within 60 minutes preceding, during, and within 60 minutes after a funeral, memorial service, funeral procession, or burial.

(Code of lowa, Sec. 723.5)
SECTION 2. SECTION REPEALED. Section 40.04 of the
Code of Ordinances of the City of Monona, Iowa, is repealed in its entirety.

SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY CLAUSE. If any section, provision, or part of this ordinance shall be adiudged invalid or unconstitutional. such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any section, provision or part thereof not adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.

by the license or permit, or permit its consumption thereon between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. on a weekday, and between the hours of 2:00 a.m. on Sunday and 6:00 a.m. on the following Monday; however, a holder of a liquor control license or retail wine or beer permit granted the privilege of selling alcoholic liquor, wine, or beer on Sunday may sell or dispense alcoholic liquor, wine, or beer between the hours of 6:00 a.m. on Sunday and 2:00 a.m. of the following Monday, and further provided that a holder of any class of liquor control license or the holder of a Class "B" beer permit may sell or dispense alcoholic liquor, wine, or beer for consumption on the premises between the hours of 6:00 a.m. on Sunday and 2:00 a.m. on Monday when that Monday is New Year's Day and beer for consumption off the premises between the hours of 6:00 a.m. on Sunday and 2:00 a.m. on the following Monday when that Sunday is the day before New Year's Day. (Code of Iowa, Sec. 123.49[2b]

and 123.150)

the Code of Ordinances of the City of Monona, lowa, are repealed and the following adopted in lieu thereof: 80.03 NOTICE BY MAIL.

1. A police authority or private entity that takes into custody an abandoned vehicle shall send notice by certified mail that the vehicle has been taken into custody no more than 20 days after taking custody of the vehicle. Notice shall be sent to the last known address of record of the last known registered owner of the vehicle, all lienholders of record, and any other known claimant to the vehicle.

2. Notice shall be deemed given when mailed. The notice shall include all of the following:

A. A description of the year,

make, model, and vehicle identification number of the vehicle. B. The location of the facility

where the vehicle is being held.

C. Information for the persons receiving the notice of their right to reclaim the vehicle and personal property contained therein within 10 days after the effective date of the notice. Persons may reclaim the vehicle or personal property upon payment of all towing, preserva-tion, and storage charges resulting from placing the vehicle in custody and upon payment of the costs of the notice required pursuant to this D. A statement that failure of the

owner, lienholders, or claimants to exercise their right to reclaim the vehicle or personal property within the time provided shall be deemed a waiver by the owner, lienholders, and claimants of all right, title, claim, and interest in the vehicle or personal property. E. A statement that failure to

reclaim the vehicle or personal property is deemed consent for the police authority or private entity to sell the vehicle at a public auction or dispose of the vehicle to a demolisher and to dispose of the personal property by sale or destruction.

3. If the abandoned vehicle was taken into custody by a private entity without a police authority's initiative, the notice shall state that the private entity may claim a garage keeper's lien as described in Section 321.90, Subsection 1, of the Code of Iowa, and may proceed to sell or dispose of the vehicle.

4. If the abandoned vehicle was taken into custody by a police authority or by a private entity hired by a police authority, the notice shall state that any person claiming rightful possession of the vehicle or personal property who disputes the planned disposition of the vehicle or personal property by the police authority or private entity or of the

assessment of fees and charges provided by this section may ask for an evidentiary hearing before the police authority to contest those

5. If the persons receiving notice do not ask for a hearing or exercise their right to reclaim the vehicle or personal property within the 10day reclaiming period, the owner, lienholders, or claimants shall no longer have any right, title, claim, or interest in or to the vehicle or the personal property. 6. A court in any case in law or

equity shall not recognize any right, title claim or interest of the owner lienholders, or claimants after the expiration of the 10-day reclaiming

7. If it is impossible to determine with reasonable certainty the identities and addresses of the last registered owner and all lienholders notice by one publication in one newspaper of general circulation in the area where the vehicle was abandoned shall be sufficient to meet all requirements of notice under Subsection 2 of this section The published notice may contain multiple listings of abandoned vehicles but shall be published within the same time requirements and contain the same information as prescribed for mailed notice in Subsection 2 of this section.

(Code of Iowa, Sec. 321.89[3]) 80.04 RECLAMATION OF ABAN-DONED VEHICLES. Prior to driving an abandoned vehicle away from the premises, a person who received or who is reclaiming the vehicle on behalf of a person who received notice under Section 80.03 shall present to the police authority or private entity, as applicable, the person's valid driver's license and proof of financial liability coverage as provided in Section 321.20B of the Code of Iowa.

BE IT ENACTED by the City Council of the City of Monona, Iowa: SECTION 1. SECTION MODI-FIED. Chapter 55, Sections 09, 10, 11, 12, and 17 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Monona, Iowa

2007, are repealed and the following adopted in lieu thereof: 55.09 DANGEROUS AND VI-

CIOUS ANIMALS 1. Definitions. For use in this

chapter, the following definitions shall apply:

A. "Dangerous Animal" means:

(a) any animal which is not naturally tame or gentle, and which is of a wild nature or disposition, and which is capable of killing, inflicting serious injury upon, or causing disease among human beings or domestic animals and have known tendencies as a species to do so; (b) the following animals, which are deemed to be dangerous animals per se:

(1) Badgers, wolverines, wea-

sels, skunks, and mink; (2) Raccoons; (3) Bats;

(4) Scorpions: (5) Piranhas;

(6) Wolves: covotes, and foxes: (7) Alligators and crocodiles;

(8) Lions, tigers, jaguars, leopards, cougars, lynx, and bobcats;

(9) Bears;

(9) Bears;
(10) Monkeys and Chimpanzees;
B. "Vicious Animal" means any
animal, except for a dangerous
animal per se, as listed above,
that has bitten or clawed a person or persons while running at large and the attack was unprovoked, or any animal that has exhibited vicious tendencies in present or past conduct, including such that said animal (a) has bitten or clawed a person or persons causing injuries without provocation; or (b) could not be controlled or restrained by the owner at the time of the attack to prevent the occurrence; or (c) has attacked any domestic animal or fowl without provocation.

C. Non-Domesticated Animals. No person shall keep or allow to be kept in the City, any non-domesticated animal or species including but not limited to the following: ocelots, dingoes, jackals, poisonous snakes, constrictors, and any other animal which is not listed above but which can reasonably be defined by the definition of terms stated herein

2. Keeping of Dangerous Animals Prohibited. No person shall keep, shelter, or harbor any dangerous animal as a pet, or act as a temporary custodian for such animal, or keep, shelter or harbor such an animal for any other purpose or in any other capacity within the City except in the following circumstances:

(a) The keeping of dangerous animals for exhibition to the public by a bona fide traveling circus, carnival, exhibit, or show.

(b) The keeping of dangerous animals in a bona fide, licensed veterinary hospital for treatment.

(c) Any dangerous animals un-

der the jurisdiction of and in the possession of the lowa Department of Natural Resources, pursuant to Chapters 481A and 481B of the Code of Iowa.

3. Sales or Purchases. No person shall possess with intent to sell, offer for sale, breed, transfer ownership of or buy or attempt to transfer ownership of or buy any dangerous animal

4. Exemptions

This section shall not apply to animals used by a police depart-

ment or law enforcement agency.

B. No animal may be declared dangerous for injury or damage sustained by a person who was

committing a willful trespass or other tort upon the premises of the animal's owner.

C. No animal may be declared dangerous for injury or damage sustained by a person who was teasing, tormenting, abusing, or as-

saulting the animal.

D. A traveling circus, zoological park, or show which keeps wild animals for a temporary exhibition may keep such animals within the city for a period not to exceed 30 days, provided the person, traveling circus, zoological park, or show has obtained a state permit or is exempt from such requirement.

5. Seizure, Impoundment and Disposition

A In the event that a dangerous animal or vicious animal is found at large and unattended upon public property, park property, public rightof-way, or the property of someone other than its owner, thereby creating a hazard to persons or property, such animal may, at the discretion of the Police Chief, be destroyed if it cannot be confined or captured. The City shall be under no duty to attempt the confinement or capture of a dangerous animal or vicious animal found at large, nor shall it have a duty to notify the owner of such animal prior to its destruction.

B. Upon the complaint of any in-dividual that a person is keeping, sheltering, or harboring a danger-ous or vicious animal on premises in the City, the City Administrator or Police Chief shall cause the matter to be investigated and if after investigation the facts indicate that the person named in the complaint is keeping, sheltering or harboring a dangerous or vicious animal in the City, the Police Chief shall order the person named in the com-plaint to safely remove such animal from the City, or humanely destroy the animal within three (3) days of the receipt of such an order. Such order shall be contained in a notice to remove the dangerous or vicious animal, which notice shall be given in writing to the person keeping, sheltering or harboring the dangerous or vicious animal, and shall be served personally or by certified mail. Such order and notice to remove the dangerous or vicious animal shall not be required where such animal has previously caused serious physical harm or death to any person, in which case the Police Chief shall cause the animal to be immediately seized and impounded or killed if seizure and impoundment are not possible without risk of serious physical harm or

death to any person.

55.10 RABIES VACCINATION Every owner of a dog or cat over six (6) months of age, being maintained or harbored, at any time in the corporate limits of the City of Monona, Iowa shall be vaccinated against rabies by an approved vaccine administered by a veterinarian who shall maintain a record of vaccination for a period of at least three (3) years, and who shall issue the owner of such animal a Vaccination Certificate (which shall be retained by said owner until it expires and is renewed) and a vaccination tag. It is unlawful for any person to own or have a dog or cat in said person's possession, six months of age or over which has not been vaccinated against rabies. A copy of the rables vaccination certificate from a licensed veterinarian, with the rabies tag number must be brought to city hall to be recorded. This vaccination certificate is good for 1- to 3-year period based on the ral vaccination schedule or certificate of that dog/cat. The failure to pro-cure such certificate when so re-quested by the Police Department or its representative shall be prima facie evidence that such animal has not been vaccinated

55.11 OWNER's DUTY It is the duty of the owner of any dog, cat or other animal which has bitten or

attacked a person or other animal or any person having knowledge of such bite or attack to report this act to the City Administrator or Police Chief. It is the duty of the physicians and veterinarians to report to the City Administrator or Police Chief the existence of any animal known or suspected to be suffering from rabies.

55.12 CONFINEMENT.

1. If the City Administrator or Police Chief receives information that an animal has bitten a person or animal or that a dog or animal is suspected of having rabies, the City Administrator or Police Chief shall apprehend and impound the animal, and the owner must cover the cost of impoundment. The owner can choose to safely remove such animal from the City and the animal can never return to the City, or humanely destroy the animal within three (3) days of the receipt of such an order from the City Administrator or Police Chief. Failure to comply with an order of the City Administra-tor or Police Chief issued pursuant to this chapter constitutes a simple misdemeanor.

 The order to remove a danger-ous or vicious animal issued by the City Administrator or Police Chief may be appealed to the Council. In order to appeal such order, a written notice of appeal must be filed with the Clerk within three (3) days after receipt of the order contained in the notice to remove the dangerous or vicious animal. Failure to file such written notice of appeal shall constitute a waiver of the right to appeal the order of the City Administrator or Police Chief.

3. The notice of appeal shall state the grounds for such appeal and shall be delivered personally or by certified mail to the Clerk. The hearing of such appeal shall be scheduled within seven (7) days of the receipt of the notice of appeal. The hearing may be continued for good cause. After such hearing, the Council may affirm or reverse the order of the City Administrator or Police Chief. Such determination shall be contained in a written decision and shall be filed with the Clerk within three (3) days after the hearing or any continued session thereof 4. If the Council affirms the action

of the City Administrator or Police Chief, the Council shall order in its written decision that the person owning, sheltering, harboring or keeping such dangerous or vicious animal remove such animal from the City or humanely destroy it. The decision and order shall immediately be served upon the person against whom rendered in the same manner as the notice of removal. If the original order of the City Administrator or Police Chief is not appealed and is not complied with within three (3) days or the order of the Council after appeal is not complied with within (3) days of its issuance, the City Administrator or Police Chief is authorized to seize, impound, or destroy such dangerous or vicious animal. Failure to comply with an order of the City Administrator or Police Chief issued pursuant to this chapter and not appealed, or of the Council after appeal, constitutes a simple misdemeanor 55.13 AT LARGE: IMPOUND-

MENT (No Change) 55.14 ANIMAL WASTE CLEAN-

55.17 DOG/CAT REGISTRATION/TAGS REQUIRED
1. Dog/Cat Registration Re-

quired. Every owner of a dog or cat shall register said dog/cat with the City. Exception to this requirement includes a thirty-day residency

grace period.
2. Registration Records.

Clerk or Police Department representative shall maintain a public record of each registration containing the name and information of the owner and name, sex, breed, color, date of birth, spayed or neutered and microchip number of the dog/ cat.

Rabies Tags.

A. The veterinarian shall issue a metal rabies vaccination tag showing the name of the veterinarian. the tag number, and the year of issuance, as required by Iowa State Law, which will duplicate as the required tag for the city.

B. The rabies tag issued by the

veterinarian shall be securely fas-tened by the owner to a collar or harness which shall be worn at all times by the dog/cat for which it was issued unless the animal is kept inside. It shall be unlawful for any person other than the owner to re move the collar from the dog or cat. C. A rabies tag issued for one dog/cat shall not be transferable

to another dog/cat. Upon the expiration of the tag the owner shall remove said tag from the dog/cat.

D. Any dog/cat found running

at large without the rabies tab attached to its collar or harness shall be deemed unvaccinated. The Monona Police Department or City Hall shall be notified immediately of all lost or reissued

Enforcement

A. Veterinarians shall in no way be responsible for the enforcement of the required tags with the City of Monona. Enforcement of this chapter shall be the responsibility of the Monona Police Department or its representatives.

B. Law enforcement officials

shall enforce the provisions of the chapter relating to vaccination and impoundment of dogs/cats. Such public officials shall not be responsible for any accident or disease of a dog/cat resulting from the enforcement of the provisions of said chapter.

C. A dog or cat shall be appre-hended and impounded by law enforcement officials if the dog/cat is running at large and/or the dog/cat is not wearing a valid rabies vacci-nation tag, or a rabies vaccination certificate is not on file with the city presented to law enforcement officials.

D. Disposition of impounded animal shall be undertaken pursuant to code § 55.16

E. Any owner of an unregistered and/or unvaccinated dog or cat is quilty of a misdemeanor and may be punished by a fine up to \$750 or by imprisonment up to 30 days. (Ch. 55 – Ord. 355-1-Sept. 12

Supp.)
