Bid Security. Each bidder shall accompany its bid with bid security as security that the successful bidder will enter into a contract for the work bid upon and will furnish after the award of contract a corporate surety bond, in form acceptable to the Jurisdiction, for the faithful performance of the contract, in an amount equal to one hundred percent of the amount of the contract. The bidder's security shall be in the amount of 5% of the total bid amount including all add alternates, and shall be the Jurisdiction's bidder's bond with corporate surety satisfactory to the Jurisdiction. No other type of bid security will be accepted. The bidder's bond shall contain no condition except as provided in the specifications.

Performance, Payment, and Maintenance Bond. The successful bidder will be required to furnish a construction performance, payment, and maintenance bond in an amount equal to one hundred percent (100%) of the contract price. Any bidder or equipment supplier whose firm or affiliate is listed in on the U.S. General Services Administration Excluded Parties List System web site at http://www.epls.gov/ will be prohibited from the bidding process. Anyone submitting a bid who is listed on this web site will be determined to be a non-responsive bidder in accordance with 40 CFR

Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (DBE) Solicitation. It is EPA's policy that recipients of EPA financial assistance through the State Revolving Fund programs award a "fair share" of subagreements to small, minority and women-owned businesses, collectively known as Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (DBEs). D. The contractor agrees to include this section 3 clause in every subcontract subject to compliance with regulations in 24 CFR part 135, and agrees to take appropriate action, as provided in an applicable provision of the subcontract or in this section 3 clause, upon a finding that the subcontractor is in vio-lation of the regulations in 24 CFR part 135. The contractor will not subcontract with any subcontractor where the contractor has notice or knowledge that the subcontractor has been found in violation of the regulations in 24 CFR part 135.

E. **ORDINANCE NO. 411-20** AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF MONONA. IOWA 2007, BY AMENDING PROVISIONS PERTAINING TO

CHAPTER 40 ~ M-2 INDUSTRIAL BE IT ENACTED by the City Council of the City of Monona,

SECTION 1. SPECIAL EXCEP-TION USES AND STRUCTURES. Chapter 40 ~ Zoning, of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Monona, lowa, is hereby amended by inserting "4" into Zoning District M-2 Industrial under the section pertaining to "Special Exception Uses and Structures" as follows:

4. A closed business, with a Clayton County Iowa parcel number 36-13-313-001, located at 21118 125th Street, Monona, Iowa may construct a dwelling unit within their commercial building. The said dwelling unit must be under 1,000 square feet, provide a reserved and maintained open yard of at least 2,400 square feet and is only occupied by one property owner. No spouse, family, or friends. SPE-CIAL NOTE: If the above said business would reopen for business, a single occupant can continue to live in the dwelling under: M-2 Industrial. PERMITTED ACCESSORY USES AND STRUCTURES #3.

SECTION 2. WHEN EFFEC-TIVE. This ordinance shall be in effect from and after its final passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

3) Monona Fire Department Re-

Monona Fire Chief, Dave Smith, went over fire report for July, August, and September. The fire chief and a couple of volunteer firefighters will be traveling to Rock Rapids, IA to check on the rescue truck that is being built for the department. It is ready to be painted and needs an okay from department that it was built correctly before painting. Hoping for a December delivery. Will be keeping old vehicle over the winter so it can be detailed and put up for sale next year. The fire department was awarded a FEMA grant of \$40,000 for the purchase of a replacement stationary air compressor which produces breathable air to fill the air pack bottles for Mono-na, Luana and Farmersburg departments. The departments cost will be around \$2,000.00. Some more paperwork is needed before the grant can be finalized.

lication 6a) Police Report

Police Chief Amsden reviewed September 2020 monthly police activity summary. They responded to 217 calls for service during Sep-tember. Chief Amsden also wanted to get the word out to residents to make sure to keep their homes and accessory building locked when not at home and during the evenings and to report any suspicious activity. Chief Amsden also mentioned that there have been several instances involving minors at City Park after hours; the police are enforcing the curfew.

6b) Clayton County 2016 Dodge Charger Purchase

Chief Amsden said that the Clay-ton County Sherriff's department will have their 2016 Dodge Charger ready for purchase soon. The cost would be \$6,000.00 The car would come with cage, radio, and lights. It would still need: computer, computer dock, printer, and in-car camera system. If the council approved the purchase, the 2009 Chevrolet Tahoe would be put out for bid. It was moved by Meyer, seconded by Elledge to approve the purchase of the Clayton County Sherriff's department's 2016 Doge Charger with VIN #2C3CDXKT0GH189258 and put the 2009 Chevrolet Tahoe up for sale asking \$4,000 or best offer with the right to refuse any or all offers. Carried Unanimously.

6c) Approve ad for Hiring Full-Time Police Officer

It was moved by Schlein, sec-onded by Elledge to approve the ad for hiring a full-time officer. Carried

unanimously.
7) Renewal of Airport Insurance City Administrator Collins in-formed the council of what the three items not covered on Global Aerospace and AIG's insurance quotes cover. She also explained that our current coverage with Starr Aviation has a \$2,000,000 Airport Bodily Injury and Property Damage Liability per each occurrence limit, but Star Aviation did give a quote to drop to a \$1,000,000 limit. Global only offered \$2,000,000 and AIG only offered \$1,000,000. After much discussion it was moved by Landt, seconded by Meyer to renew the Monona Municipal Airport insur-ance with the current provider, Starr Aviation, but drop the coverage to \$1,000,000 for \$1,158 with an annual renewal and waive the Terror-ism coverage. Carried Unanimous-

8) Approve Public Notice Ad for Annexation and to Move Forward with Annexation

City Administrator Collins informed the council that the city had received three letters from property owners requesting voluntary Annexation into the city limits of Monona. The property is located south of HWY 18/52 and west of Falcon Upon recommendation of City Administrator to continue forward with the annexation process it was moved by Wright, seconded by Landt to proceed with the Public Notice Ad for 100 % Voluntary Annexation for six parcels south of HWY 18/52 and west of Falcon Avenue. Carried Unanimously.

The council can not take further action until 14 day after the posting of the ad in the local newspaper and a letter submitted to the Clayand a letter submitted to the Clayton County Supervisors. A special council meeting was set for Thursday, November 5th at 5:30 p.m.

9) Approve Resolution 2020-22 Amending "Access Easement Agreement" for Halvorson Property

City Administrator Collins re-minded the council that they had approved the draft of an Access Easement Agreement between the City of Monona, as Grantor, and Halvorson, as Grantee at the August 3, 2020 council meeting. The draft was then given to the Grantee for their approval. The Grantee came back and asked that an Exhibit "A" be attached to the agreement showing an aerial view of the location of the easement contemplate herein. Attorney Schiller added the necessary language to para-graph #6 of the draft. After looking over the updated Access Easement Agreement it was moved by Meyer. seconded by Landt to approve Resolution 2020-22 Approving Addition to Access Easement Agreement. Roll Call Vote: Ayes ~ Five, Nays ~ None. Carried Unanimously. Resolution Adopted.

10) Go Over Report from "Eagle Point Solar"

City Administrator Collins met with Kent Kraus, Eagle Point Solar, to learn more about the possibility of using solar to cut the cost of the city's electric bill. Former Mayor, Marty Martinson, and Former City Administrator, Dan Canton, started looking into solar as an alternative to using electricity generated through Alliant Energy back in 2018 and 2019. The project was put on hold due to various issues. Collins was contacted by Eagle Point Solar out of Dubuque and along with Kent Kraus put together some pre-liminary numbers on the cost and possible locations of solar use by the city, estimated construction cost and possible savings on future elecand possible savings on future elec-tric bills. These numbers were very preliminary, and Collins stated that she would need a motion to have Eagle Point Solar look deeper into getting some more hard-core fig-ures. There would be no cost to the city for this information. After some more discussion it was moved by Meyer, seconded by Elledge to move forward with Eagle Point Solar and get more information. Car-

ried Unanimously. 11) DNR Right of Entry and Indemnity Agreement

The Iowa Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and the Iowa Comprehensive Petroleum Underground Storage Tank Fund Board (FUND) have jointly entered into a contract with Seneca to conduct certain environmental corrective actions at the underground storge tank site located at 114 S. Main St., Monona, Iowa. The location is mainly the parking lot south of FreedomBank, Originally the DNR wanted to break up most of the parking lot, city sidewalks and part of Iowa and Main streets to remove the contaminated soil and replace with clean soil. The DNR has now decided to not remove the soil but to inject PetroFix into the soil and then suck up the contamination over three different time periods. This procedure would require much less disruption to the surrounding area and would have no cost to the city. After much discussion, it was moved by Wright, seconded by Landt to sign the Iowa Department of Natural Resources and Iowa Comprehensive Petroleum Underground Storage Tank Fund's "Right of Entry and Indemnity Agreement" Carried Unanimously.
